
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#### EDITOR'S INTRODUCTION.

In issuing this the initial number of the EDMONTON DISTRICT DIRECTORY, the editor takes pleasure in presenting to his subscribers a Directory far in advance of what it was the original intention to make it.

Independent of the Directory there has been incorporated in it much useful information relative to the Edmonton District that has not heretofore appeared in print. This has been carefully compiled and is presented in a concise form, so that as a valuable book of reference, or as a means of sending reliable information of the district to friends and enquirers abroad it is invaluable, for no more complete history and Directory of the district has ever been printed.

This Directory is entirely a private enterprise, is not published to serve the interest of government, corporation or company, and is dependent for support upon its usefulness and as a faithful delineator of the Edmonton District.

This is the first Directory of its kind ever attempted in a province where there are no municipalities nor means of collecting a list of residents of the district and our thanks are hereby tendered to Major A. H. Griesbach, Superintendent of "G" Division N.W.M.P. Fort Saskatchewan, who permitted the use of the census books taken for police purposes during 1894, which has so greatly assisted in making this directory so complete.

The editor is conscious of the fact that many names of settlers in the district covered do not appear, and many inaccuracies may occur, especially in the spelling of names; but we are pleased to state that it is wonderfully complete and correct considering the disadvantages and obstacles in the way of getting a complete and perfect list.

In order to obviate the difficulty arising from a similarity in the numbers of streets on the Hudson's Bay Reserve and the rest of the town of Edmonton. The names of streets on the Hudson's Bay Reserve are in figures throughout this Directory while the streets of similar numbers apart from the Reserve, are lettered.

The illustrated cover will no doubt arrest the attention of even the most casual observer, fur not only is it a work of art of the highest order in pen and ink sketching; but it embraces so much of that which is identified with the history of the district as to be at once appropriate and instructive.

No effort has been made in this Directory to make any ostentatious personal mention of our advertisers to the exclusion of those persons in business who have not given this Directory financial support ; but it has been our desire to first of all faithfully represent the district treated on, and secondly give that prominence to our advertisers which their generosity and public spirit deserves.

# **EDMONTON DISTRICT** DIRECTORY

#### THE EDMONTON DISTRICT

North of the Red Deer River, the general undulations of Alberta sink towards the North Saskatchewan, varying from an elevation of 3411 ft. above sea level at Calgary to an elevation of 2232 ft. at Edmonton. This district is invariably known as the Edmonton District and extends along the Saskatchewan Valley to Victoria and north to St. Albert and the region beyond. Its summers are characterized by long evenings and its winters by short days. The summer evening twilight lingers until ten and eleven o'clock, and during the longest days there is scarcely any night at all. This has a wonderful effect upon vegetation, which, combined with the fertile soil and low elevation, makes this one of the richest agricultural districts in the world. What effect altitude has over latitude, we can only tell by comparison ; suffice it to say that this district is in the same latitude with Y. Wyddffa, the highest peak in the Snowden range, 3570 ft. above sea level. In the valleys beneath at a lower elevation, crops of all descriptions are raised, so in Alberta at points in the Rocky Mountains, like Banff, at an elevation of 4500 ft., agriculture is not followed; but at points with lower elevations in the same latitude farming is carried on most successfully. The N. Saskatchewan valley has a lower elevation than any other district in Alberta. For this reason it is not subject, to early summer frosts.

Its soil is a black vegetable loam, equalled only by the Red River Valley, the delta of the Ganges and the overflow of several South American rivers. Wheat, oats, barley and other cereals are very prolific, wheat yielding as high as 40 and 45 bush. to the acre, oats 125 bush. and barley 60 bush.; but the average may be estimated at less than these figures and in some seasons considerably less. Vegetables grow remarkably well. Turnips beets and mangel wurtzels comparable with those grown anywhere, celery 31 ft. high, cabbage 43 lbs. each, potatoes 2 lbs. each. Ripe corn, tomatoes, melons and pumpkins, grown in the open air, vied with each other for prizes of excellence at the fall exhibitions of 1594.

Fruit-growing has not been a success as yet. The few trees planted have grown so rapidly and spindled that they either died from weakness after a year or two's growth or came to unfortunate ends. The only apple grown in the district was grown in the garden of Frank Oliver, Edmonton, in 1893, on a tree two years old, untrimmed and of rank growth. Rabbits settled its fate during the following winter and many other promising trees shared a like fate. So far fruit-growing is in an experimental stage and the wild strawberries. Saskatoon berries, raspberries, cranberries, domestic currants, gooseberries and imported fruits have to be depended on.

The industries of the district are lumbering, coal mining, gold washing, trapping and farming. Good water, free from alkali, is to be found everywhere, running streams of clear fresh water course through the copses, lakes containing whitefish and pickerel on which are found in spring and fail flocks of geese, ducks, swans and some thirty species of water fowl, intersperse the district and make it most suitable for the sportsman, the fisherman and the rancher.

The lands on the Saskatchewan are fast being taken up by settlers, even to a distance of thirty and forty miles from Edmonton, while new comers who desire the convenience of a near market and proximity to town, find land at reasonable prices near Edmonton, St. Albert and Ft. Saskatchewan, the principal towns in the district. Reliable land agents who know the district and will give every assistance and information to new corners are to be found in our advertising pages, and much valuable information not given here can be learned from them.

School districts are continually being formed where the settlements warrant it. Each district supports its own school, assisted by a legislative grant towards the teacher's salary. Apart from this there are no taxes.

There is a good market for all kinds of grain, butter, eggs and farm produce at Edmonton; but so limited has been the supply of the latter (it barely exceeding the local demand) that no attention has been given to it by British Columbia commission agents who now purchase in car load lots from Manitoba and Ontario centers; but who, on account of the proximity of the Edmonton district and its excellent products would much prefer to buy their supplies near home. It is only during last year that hogs to any extent have been raised in the district. Now the farmers are devoting attention to this industry and a very hopeful outlook is the result. A large number of sheep have also been imported so that there are at present some seven or eight thousand in the Saskatchewan valley. The want of a woolen mill and tannery is very much felt, as wool and hides are of very little value now.

A feature of the Saskatchewan Valley is its native grasses, which have beaten the world wherever shown. Grass in the Birch Lake district has been tied across the saddle of horses by travelers riding through the waving mass and it is a common thing for horses to be lost to view when but a few yards away. Wild peas, vetches, blue joint and other grasses make nutritive fodder and for pasture no country in the world can surpass it\_

Further north and west, in the Peace River and Athabasca districts, at the various missions and Hudson Bay posts as far north as Ft. Resolution (749 mls. north of Edmonton) excellent potatoes and garden produce are raised, and cereals have been grown on the flats of the McKenzie river at various points with undoubted success. The higher lands *are* not free from summer frost much of it is timber land; but in places there are open prairies suitable for ranching This wild district is the fur district of the northwest and the home of the beaver, the otter, the bear, the marten, the lynx, the musk ox and wood buffalo, inhabited only by the Indians, the trapper, the missionary and the Hudson's Bay Company's officers. It is reached by the Hudson's Bay Co. steamers, the "Athabasca," "Grahame" and "Wrigley"

which ply between Athabasca Landing and Grand Rapids, Grand Rapids and Smith's Landing, Ft. Smith and the arctic circle. between 300 and 400 tons of freight are annually carried on these boats to the various posts and missions between Athabasca Landing, the arctic circle, the Peace and Liard rivers. None but explorers, adventurers and trappers go into this district; but for the convenience of tourists and adventurers we have embraced in this directory a table giving the distance in miles to the various H- B. posts as well as a rate of passenger fares and freight rates charged. These rates are not absolute, the company giving special rates to missionaries and reserving to itself the right to vary them at will.

#### **Economic Minerals.**

Coal.-The enormous deposits of coal and ignites that underlie an area of more than 12,000 square miles must be considered as first in value and importance among the economic minerals of Alberta. Coal crops out at various places on the North Saskatchewan and other rivers of the district which assays and tests have proved to be equal to many of the eastern coals and fully equal to the ignites so largely used in Colorado, Wyoming and other western states where the consumption for Colorado alone, inclusive of the cities of New Denver and Canon cities amounts to over 1200,000 tons annually. An analysis of coal found in the two districts is here given for comparison.

On the North Saskatchewan, many seams outcrop at various points on the river, the thickest being twenty-five feet extending in a visible straight line for over three miles retaining its thickness. In one place it is seen to extend a mile back from the river. Computing its average thickness at twenty feet in order to allow for any local constrictions, this Small area will be found to contain over 150,001,000 tons. On the Red Deer river the seam contains about 12,500,000 tons per square mile, and on Devil's Pine Creek

about 5,500,000 tons to the square mile. This seam has been traced more or less continuously for one hundred and eighty miles. A seam of coal varying from eight to ten feet underlies the town of Edmonton. It is mined by private individuals who retail it to residents of the town at \$2.0 per ton. Nine mines are now in operation employing about thirty-five men.

Gold.-The first record of gold having been found in the North Saskatchewan is credited to Or. Hector, who made Edmonton his headquarters between Oct 7th, 1858, and the summer of 1859. From that date, straggling adventurers forced their way up the river and with rude tin plates, bored with small holes which answered for a" grizly," made amounts varying from \$7 to \$10 a day washing gold from the bars of the river. Since then the number of miners has annually increased until last year about one hundred and fifty men spent the spring and fall months when the water was lowest washing for the golden sand. During the six months of ruining the Imperial Bank at Edmonton paid out for gold amalgam about \$15,000, but much of the gold found its way to eastern markets through other channels. At present, good miners make from \$2 to \$5 a day ; but many "tenderfeet," as the new comers are called, often have to content themselves with 65c to \$1.00.

*Clay.-Clay* for bricks and pottery is to be found in the boulder clay in considerable quantity as well as throughout the Pierre and Edmonton series. In the latter a smooth clay is found which bakes to a fine porcelain-like mass, and although not manufactured into stoneware at present is very suitable for such. There are three brickyards at Edmonton and one at Red Deer which manufacture about 1,000,000 brick annually.

*Building Stone.-The* district has not as yet proven to be abundantly supplied with building stone; but during 1894 a strata of 'sandstone of good quality that works freely was discovered and has been used with satisfaction for sills and ornamental coverings for brick buildings in Edmonton.

Lime and Cement.-Out side the limit of the mountains there is very little lime and that now in use in the district is imported from Kananaskis in Southern Alberta. There are, however, some hard nodular bands at places along the Saskatchewan, notably in Township 47, range 9 west of the 5th principal meridian which when burned down make excellent lime. A good cement can also be made from many of the clayey concretions which are found in immense numbers throughout the shales of the Pierre group. (Geological Report, J. B. Tyrrell. F. G. S., 1887.)

.Petroleum.-*The* most extensive deposit of tar sands in the known world and according to geological reports, the greatest area of petroleum, is to be found in the Athabasca region. During last year the Dominion Government began boring for oil at Athabasca Landing and continuation of the work will be proceeded with this year.

Salt is found in the Athabasca district.

#### Edmonton.

EDMONTON is the principal town on the North Saskatchewan, a river that takes its rise from many glacier fed streams flowing from the watershed range of the Rocky 'Mountains. About seventy miles from its course it meets the Clearwater river and from there becomes navigable for small boats ; but in many places is very shallow and flows rapidly, on account of which it was named by the Cree Indians. Kis-is-ska-tche-wan or rapid river. G. Franchere, who in 1814 decended it from Fort George, thus describes it :-" The River Saskatchewan is one of the prettiest

rivers in the world. The banks are perfectly charming and offer in many places a scene the fairest, the most smiling and the beet diversified that can be seen or imagined ; hills in varied forms, .crowned with superb groves; valleys agreeably embrowned at evening and morning by the prolonged shadows of the hills and of the woods which adorn them; the melodious and varied song of a thousand birds perched on the tree tops; the refreshing breath of the zephyrs, the serenity of the sky, the purity and salubrity of the air; all in a word.pours contentment and joy into the soul of the enchanted spectator. It is above all in the morning, when the sun is rising, and in the evening when it is setting that the spectacle is really ravishing. I could not detach my regards front that superb picture till the nascent obscurity had obliterated **its** perfection. Then to the sweet pleasure that I tasted succeeded a triste not to say a sombre melancholy. How comes it to pass, I said to myself, that so beautiful a country is not inhabited by human beings? The songs, the hymns, the prayers of the labourer and the artisan, shall they never be heard in these fine plains?" Franchere's reverie was the reverie of the artist and the poet. His description is as true to-day as it was more than half a century ago and could he have lived until today he would have seen his closing thoughts and speculations most pleasantly realized. Edmonton, a fast growing commercial centre, has sprung up on the north side of the river, while since the advent of the C.&E. a large settlement with stores, schools, churches and commercial business activity has sprung up in the vicinity of the railway station. Edmonton, on account of the natural trend of the country and the Indian trails from Yellow Head Pass, the Peace River, the McKenzie basin and the vast region to the north-east and west centering there, has been the chief point of trade since the district was first discovered. During the past century it was the post of the Northwest Fur Trading Company and known to early travellers as Fort Augustus, changing its name to Fort Edmonton upon the advent of the Hudson's Bay Company early in the present century. The fort still exists upon the old site, dismantled of its bastions and embattlements which made it a post of defence in years gone by; but in honor of old times and customs its cannons, the stands and wheels of which are broken and embedded in the banks they in years past protected, are occasionally loaded on national days to fire a fees de joie. For some years prior to the advent of the railway Ft. Edmonton was made the source of supply and central station for the district to the far north, the supplies being brought tip the Saskatchewan from Winnipeg by means of large stern-wheeled steamers. Today most of the supplies are brought to Ft Edmonton by rail and distributed to the north by wagon, steamer and dog train. All the furs collected by the Hudson Bay posts as far as the arctic circle are brought to Ft. Edmonton for shipment and amount in value to over \$300,000 annually. Edmonton is the centre of the fur trade, and American firms send their agents to purchase furs from trappers and traders who make Edmonton their market during the winter and spring months. Competition is keen and good prices are paid. Three firms, exclusive of the H. B. Co. and general stores who also dial in furs, do vote their whole attention to fur buying and all are kept in touch with the English and New York markets by wire when fluctuations in the market warrant it. Apart from the H. B. Co. there is usually shipped from Edmonton about \$120,000 worth of furs.

As yet, Edmonton has no railway station within the town, the C. & E. station being about two miles distant on the south side of the river The town is picturesquely and healthily situated

on the north bank of the Saskatchewan. Jasper Avenue, the main street, is one unbroken street extending for a distance of about a mile, excellently graded and furnished with sidewalk and crossings and well built up with substantial brick and frame buildings. Business lots sell from \$20 to \$75 per foot frontage. Business of all kinds is conducted here, there being over 250 offices and places of business within the corporation. The population of the town, exclusive of floating population is 1292. Its buildings in 1893 increased over \$100,000 and in 1894 about \$65,000. Owing to the increase in settlement and the increased area of land under cultivation, five grain warehouses were built in 1894. Although the crop in most sections was lighter than in 1893, except wheat, which was heavier, more grain had been marketed before January 1st, 1895, than was marketed during the whole season of the year previous. Besides a grain centre, Edmonton is the centre of the lumbering interests of the district. Spruce logs are rafted down the Saskatchewan from timber limits up the river and are sawn into lumber by steam sawmills on the river banks. The town of Edmonton has been incorporated four years, has town hall, Crown land and timber offices, inland revenue office (excise) and bonding warehouse, a detachment of the N.W.M. Police, a division of the Supreme Court, steam and chemical fire engines, hose and ladder companies, electric light, telephone and telegraph, societies, churches, chartered banks, bus line and other conveniences of civilization, is situated in the midst of a rich farming and mineral district and is one of the foremost towns in the Canadian Northwest.

No person shall suffer any horse, bull, ox, cow, sheep, pig, or other cattle or geese or other poultry to run at large or trespass or do damage on any person's property, within the limits of the municipality, and any such animals so running at large or trespassing and doing damage as aforesaid shall be liable to be distrained and impounded therefor and shall be subject to the provisions of this By-Law.

#### ST. ALBERT.

SI ALBERT. The village of St. Albert is prettily situated in a rivine on the Sturgeon river near its exit from Big Lake, about nine miles from Edmonton. It is surrounded by a rich and fertile country, and has been partially settled for the last quarter of the present century. The river lots on the Sturgeon river were largely taken up some years ago by French settlers who now have thriving farms, rich in the products of the field and well stocked with horses, cattle, sheep and pigs. Durin, the past few years a large portion of the vacant government and C P R lands have been taken up; but there are still vacant homesteads for new arrivals in the district, and cultivated lands near town can be bought at reasonable prices. St. Albert is the See of Bishop Grandin, The palace, convent, School and church are all situated on the north bank of the ravine commanding a beautiful view of the lake. town, river and country. The Grandin, The palace, convent, School and church are all situated on the north bank of the ravine commanding a beautiful view of the lake, town, river and country. The buildings are in the Elizabethan style, surrounded by garden, shrubbery and trees, among which is strikingly noticeable a figure of the Blessed Virgin Mary, cut out of a tree and shapen with a knife by one of the brothers of the mission. So cleverly executed is this sculptured work, that it resembles a white marble statue. In connection with the mission is a peal of bells which at eventide call the toiler to devotion and ring through the clear air to the far-off settlers the solemn thoughts of the closing day. St. Albert is a station of the N.W.M. Police, has telephone communication with Edmonton, various societies and clubs, a juvenile brass band, several stores and is a busy little ti ads centre.

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

### FORT SASKETCHEWAN.

Fort Saskatchewan, or Si ma-gan-is, meaning" Soldier's House, as it is called by the Cree Indians, was named by the late Col. Janvis, who, in 1874, made this the divisional point for the NorthWest Mounted Police and here erected a large fort and barracks, which in latter days have been much improved upon, until to-day, under the supervision of Superintendent A. H. Griesbach, the fort is a small villa a with accommodation for eighty men and officers, has its c own blacksmith shop, fire engine, canteen, telegraph offices, and is a model of discipline and neatness. The town is picturesquely situated on the south bank of the Saskatchewan, about twenty riles N, E. of Edmonton and is surrounded by a rich agricultural country. The river here is rich in gold, and a large number of miners are continually engaged in washing for the coveted metal when the water is at its lowest. Platinum, graphite, rubies, agates, Alaska brilliants and other minerals have also been found here. Fort Saskatchewan is the market for the settlement at Clover Bar, Beaver Hills, Limestone Lake, Victoria, Egg Lake, Beaver Lake and the Vermillion; settlements in which a large amount of immigration has directed itself within the past two ears. There is still much land open for homesteads, all of which is rich and fertile, and about 3,200 feet above sea level. During 1894 several new townships were surveyed and are now open for settlement. The town itself contains schools, churches, stores, hotels and livery and will have a tannery and brickyard during -the present year. There is also a settlement on the north bank of the river with stores, R. C. church, schoolhouse, hotel and houses.

### Homestead Regulations.

All even numbered sections, excepting 8 and 26, are open for homestead entry (160 acres) by any person sole head of a family, or any male over age of eighteen years.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situate or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, or the Commissioner of Dominion Lands, Winnipeg, receive authority for some one to be named by the intending settler near the local office to make the entry for him. Entry fee 10.

Homestead Ditties are to be performed by three years' cultivation and residence, during which period the settler may not be absent for more than six months in any one year without forfeiting the entry. **Application for Patent** may be made before the local cont or any bomestered importer.

Application for Patent may be made before the local agent or any homestead inspector. Six months' notice must be given in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands by a settler of his intention, prior to making application for patent. Pre-emptions are by law abolished and may not be entered for after January 1st, 1890. A second homestead may be taken by ant one who has

performed the duties to entitle him to a certificate of recommendation for the first homestead on or prior to June 2nd, 1888. Forfeited or cancelled

### Game Laws. North-West Territories (1893).

Close season for elk, mose, cariboo, antelope, deer, mountain sheep or goat, February 1st to September 1st, Hunters are limited to six heads except for food of self or family.

Close season for buffalo, grouse, partridge, pheasant and prairie chicken, January 1st to September 1st. Wild duck (any kind), May 15th to August 23rd. Plover, sandpiper and snipe, January 1st to August 1st.

Close season for mink, marten and fisher, April 15th to November 1st. Otter and beaver, May 15th to October 1st. Muskrat, May 15th to November 1st.

Swivel gun-3, batteries, sunken punts, night lights, food steeped in narcotics for stupefying and capturing any wild fowl excepting geese, are unlawful, as also are

any wild towl excepting geese, are unlawful, as also are ropes, nets, springs, cages, traps or engines. Grouse, partridge, pheasant, prairie chicken, elk, moose, cariboo, antelope or their fawn may not taken or shipped out of the N.W. Territories, and no person shall offer for sale, barter or exchange, prairie chicken killed by any person other than himself. Licenses that expire May 15th annually are granted to nonresidents of the N.W.T. for \$5.

### Fishery Regulations, N.W.T.

F. C. Gilchrist, Fort Qu'Appelle, Fishery Inspector. Whitefish, tallibee, salmon or lake trout may not be caught, bought, sold or had in possession between October 5th and December 15th; pickerel, pike, gold eyes, mullets, April 15th and May 15th; sturgeon, May 15th and July 15th; speckled trout not between September 15th and May 1st; maskanonge, 15th April and 16th May, under penalty not exceeding \$100. Indians can fib during close scores for the

Indians can fish during close season for own

consumption only.

Net fishing of any kind is prohibited in public water except under leases or licensee. The use of explosive or poisonous substances is illegal. Catching or killing young of any fish is prohibited. Placing sawdust or other deleterious substances in the water is prohibited. prohibited.



#### DOMINION LANDS.

#### Coal Lands.

**If surveyed,** can he purchased by one individual to the extent of 320 acres, price \$10 per acre for soft coal, \$20 per acre for anthricite. Furchaser has to pay no royalty, nor yet compelled to work same.

#### Right to Explore for Coal.

On staking out, boundaries North and South, East and West lines, marking oil each post the name of individual staking same, date of such staking; then apply to Minister of Interior, who will grant right to explore for sixty days, on expenditure of at least \$2 per day. At expiration of sixty days a further extension may be granted if asked for. This right to explore enables parties to satisfy themselves whether there is sufficient coal on the property to warrant the purchase the purchase.

#### Minerals Other Than Coal.

Size, maximum  $1500 \ge 600$  feet, and in any other shape so that the length does not exceed three times the breadth. Courses of boundaries any direction desired. boundaries to be four straight lines, opposite sides or ends boundaries to be four straight lines, opposite sides or ends parallel, except in cases where from prior locations that cannot be obtained, in which cases the Superintendent of Mines will permit that condition to be waived. To be staked cut by claimant personally, marking his name, date of staking, etc., thereon; if in timber to cut out and well blaze the boundaries. After staking, has sixty days to register with local land agent, pays fee \$6, receives a receipt. All assignments must be endorsed on back of original receipts and if unconditional on filing same with crant ord receipts, and if unconditional, on filing same with agent and on payment of a fee of \$2. a receipt in favor of the assignee will be issued. Development to beat least \$100 per annum in actual mining operations, proof of such development to be filed with agent ; failure to do so will be considered as abandonment of claim.

So soon as \$500 development has been performed on claim he may purchase, paying \$5 per acre. If in unsurveyed territory, must furnish survey and description of same, or deposit \$50, for which sum the Department of Interior will, so soon as possible, make the necessary surveys. No royalty on any of the output of minerals.

One party can only take one claim on the same lode, ledge or mine; cannot stake out for another. If not recorded within sixty days after staking, it at that date becomes vacant Dominion lands.

The Minister of the Interior on application may grant for iron ail area to the extent of 160 acres, if he be satisfied of the good faith and ability of the applicants to operate that area.

Quarry lots, whether for building material, lime, slate or lay for pottery, bricks, etc., can be taken up under these regulations, that is to an area not exceeding 1500 x 600 feet, etc., recording, assigning, etc, as heretofore, development at least \$100 per annum, and the Minister assumes the right to sell the same to the claimant at price agreed upon, or work the same under a royalty not exceeding n per cent, on output.

### Placer Mining.

The size of claim varies from 100 in width extending across bed of ordinary stream from bank to bank, to an area of ten acres where there is a large area.

**Petroleum.** Conditions under which rights to petroleum can be acquired may be obtained of the Minister of the Interior. They vary according to location and area desired to be tested.

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
